Cobblestone presentation by Pam Becker

The Macedon Historical Society (MHS) provides a "Community Chat" on a quarterly basis at our historic Macedon Academy. On August 13th we were honored to learn about cobblestone structures from Seneca County Historian Pamela Becker. The presentation was about the importance of cobblestone buildings and how they were constructed in our area during the mid-



Using an easily obtainable natural resource made our area the home of the

most cobblestone buildings in the world! Farmers and builders would gather cobblestones from nearby lakes. These small round stones surfaced following



1800's.

the movement of glaciers. People would use sorting boards to separate stones by size and



color. Stones were set in intricate patterns primarily on the front of the buildings, less care was

often taken on the walls not easily visible. A readily available supply of limestone helped with the quoins (corner supports) and lintels (supports above

windows and doors). Sometimes bricks would be used for these features as in the Bullis House.

Ms. Becker engaged in a lively discussion with several participants including Mr. Dave Taber, a teacher and life-long resident of the area as well as Gene Bavis, Walworth Town Historian. Learning continues at the Macedon Academy.



We look forward to sharing more educational and entertainment activities with our community.

"NO FREEDOM SHRIEKER" by Dr. Katie Aldrich Durrant

Among the piles of knickknacks, haystacks, dust and

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debris abandoned in her historic barn, Katie Aldridge Durrant, discovered a box containing the Civil War letters of Charles Freeman Biddlecom. Painstakingly transcribing and lightly editing more than 100 letters written by the soldier to his wife during his service, Ms

(Aldridge) Durrant resurrected the voice of the

Civil War combat soldier. The tone

and character of Charlie's detailed accounts of the war compelled Ms. (Aldridge) Durrant to find out more.

From letters written throughout Grant's Overland and Richmond-Petersburg campaigns, the reader gains an insider's view of the war, fear, hunger, sickness,

longing and concern for those left behind, and de-

tailed insights about the political climate. Composed from a perspective forged in an Upstate New York community closely linked to the abolitionist cause, woman's suffrage, and the Quaker philosophy, in *No Freedom Shrieker*, the reader will learn how Charlie's background shaped his actions and evolving view of the war.

The Rochester, Syracuse and Eastern Railroad

The Rochester, Syracuse and Eastern Railroad was incorporated on Nov 7, 1901 for the purpose of constructing an electric high speed double track railroad between Rochester and Syracuse. Clifford D. Beebe and about 12 business men from Syracuse promoted the line. The group was known as the Beebe Syndicate.

Surveying began in 1902. Construction started in August, 1904. The first section of the line opened for regular service between Newark and Macedon on July 2, 1906. Construction was completed and through-service between Rochester and Syracuse began on Dec 19, 1909.

Electric power for the line was generated at 33,000 volts ac (alternating current) in a company owned coal fired power plant in Lyons. From there it was transmitted to substations that were spaced about every 10 miles along the line. In 1912 the Lyons plant was sold to a commercial power utility and from then on power was purchased from outside sources. The substations received the high voltage ac and reduced and converted it to 650 volts dc (direct current) for use by the trolley cars. One of the substations was located along the line in Macedon. The building still exists and is located at the end of Beebe Road (possibly named for Clifford D. Beebe).

The line was divided into 8 maintenance sections each approximately 10 miles long. A crew consisting of a foreman and 4 men

(plus 2 additional men in summer) was responsible for track and roadway in their section. The track was walked twice a day to check for defects or broken rails. A section house was placed next to the track to store tools and a hand car. There was a section house in Macedon that was probably located near what is now the intersection of Route 31 and Beebe Road. It was moved to a farm and used as agarage or shed and still existed until recently.

The RS&E right of way (ROW) entered Macedon from the west about .4 mile south of present Route 31. It




The Macedon section house as it appeared in 2015. It no longer exists.

crossed Route 31 at Beebe Road (which was constructed on the trolley ROW). Continuing east it crossed Canandaigua Road about 600 feet north of Route 31 and entered Main Street about at Drumlin Drive. After passing through the village on Main Street the line resumed on private ROW to Palmyra. This section of ROW was used for the construction of the current path of Route 31.

Although many villages on the RS&E had stations, Macedon did not. There was a ticket office located in a store front in the building that still exists at 97-101 Main Street. A standard octagonal waiting shelter was placed at many country road crossings. There were seven in the town.

The line was never very profitable and became the Rochester & Syracuse Railroad in 1917 during a restructuring. As more passengers left the electric cars for automobiles deficits increased during the late 1920s and the end drew near. Operations on the line came to an end with the last cars running on June 27, 1931.







A typical section crew with their handcar. This picture was not taken in Macedon.




