Everyone Loves History

Christopher Blomgren a retired History teacher presented this scenario at the Fall Author's Forum this year.

Yes, you read that right: Everyone loves history. "But wait," someone says, I teach history, and I can tell you right now, many MANY people do not love history." And someone else is thinking, "What is this guy talking about? I don't love history. I don't even like history." Perhaps someone else is even asserting, "I hate history, especially American history. Most of the history we were forced to study was a bunch of pointless propaganda and

lame myths."

Okay, so maybe I wrote the heading just to suck you into the conversation. What I should have written was, everyone is *wired* to love history. There are many reasons why people *learn* to hate history, but that is a topic for another day. Right <u>now</u> I want to forward this premise; People are wired to love history.

My job involves convincing a cohort of 100 7th graders that this is true. But have you ever tried to convince a group of 12 year olds that they are wrong and you are right? About anything? If so, welcome to my world...

But while I have never been able to convince an entire class that history is a relevant, exciting, naturally engaging pursuit, I have batted around 80%, an average that lets me sleep peacefully most nights.

So how do I do it? Well, allow e to share some of my finely crafted vignettes and metaphors that tend to win kids over (or at least cause them to pause with a sour look on their face):

- 1. History allows us to legit peek at someone else's text messages (I used to say diaries, but they don't know what that is anymore). Have you ever been tempted to read someone else's mail, allowing you to sneak a peek at people's innermost thoughts, motivations and desires? Then you might be tempted to study history.
- 2. Do you enjoy taking or looking at photos? Why is this? Because you want to remember something from the past and maybe share it with others? Hmm, sounds like history.
- 3. You have just moved into a new house. In the attic of this house is an old trunk. Nobody knows what is in it, but there are many rumors floating around. It is locked, but the lock is flimsy. You thnk you could get this trunk open with a little effort. Do you take the time to open it? Why? Your answer explains why you like history.
- 4. You are trying to decide on a movie to watch and you have narrowed it down to two choices. The movies seem to be the same in every way, but one of them says, "Based on a true story." Which movie are you more likely to watch? What does this tell you?
- 5. In the corner is a time machine. If you choose to use it, you can go back to any place, any time that you want. You can see and hear much of what is going on,



On September 29, 2024, Jane Milem, presented some additional ways to conduct historical research to an enthusiastic group of people. The people in attendance at the Historic Macedon Academy included local residents and area historians.

Jane reviewed ways that anyone can utilize the Wayne County Historian's office to conduct

their research. Located in the basement of the Public Safety Building. 7376 State Route 31, STE 100, Lyons, NY. It is a unique place to visit. The historian's office begins with a phone call from the lobby of the Wayne County Office building. People need to be escorted to the basement of this building where all the archives are stored. Anyone is welcome to request information, or to go to the site to do their own research. The website includes a surname database which allows you to search for specific family names.

From the Historian's website click on the Historian's Surname Database. Jane has included specific instructions and recommendations to make a search successful.

Jane also shared the usefulness of the Wayne Historians Organization's

website: https://waynehistorians.org/. This site, created with the help of local historians, is a place where people can research local historic sites, Wayne County Civil War Soldiers and Notable People from Wayne County.



Student Volunteer - Erika Newcombe



Erika Newcombe was instrumental in restoring the Old Baptist Cemetery off Walworth Road. This year Erika received her Girl Scout Gold Award for the work she has done on the Old Baptist Cemetery restoration project. Some of the websites Erika and her mom, Dee used were the MANY website to help with the research. Not only did they research online but they have also attended 'field training'. In June they were invited to the Webster Union Cemetery and attended a cemetery preservation 'class' hosted by the cemetery, where they had Mark Morten of Gravestone Guardians of Ohio teach the proper way to clean and repair headstones. Dave Bloom (The Gravestone Guy) from Farmington, and Scott Banker from Greece were also on hand. The next morning after the training in Webster, the 3 professional headstone repairmen joined us at the Old Baptist Cemetery in Macedon and applied what they had learned, along with help from Erika's Dad, Scott and help from Brian Kelly from the Macedon Historical Society. Everyone left that evening feeling satisfied (and tired) with what they had accomplished.

With the information they gathered, they were able to order military headstones for a few of the veterans through the Department of Veteran Affairs. One headstone application was approved, and the headstone is currently at the Macedon Highway Dept. The headstone will be placed in the cemetery in the spring of 2025. The second application was denied because the veteran has a personal headstone already in the cemetery and didn't meet the requirements for a new one. The last headstone application, they are desperately trying to find documentation that of the Revolutionary War Veteran (Aaron Brister 1762-1821) was in fact buried at the Old Baptist cemetery as his application is pending until we find documentation. His wife is buried thee and with a lot of help, her large broken headstone was set upright. There are more records of Revolutionary War veterans that are buried at the Old Baptist cemetery that do not have any headstones. That is another project of the Newcombe's will be applying for military headstones for them as well. Currently there are 5 Revolutionary War veterans and 2 War of 1812 veterans in the cemetery. With the new winter season approaching there is a hold on any more work at the cemetery until spring 2025.

Erika is attending college full time, works part-time and in her spare time she continues to do research and update her website. In December Erika will have earned her associate degree at FLCC and in January she will be transferring to Hobar and William Smith Colleges to continue her major of Creative Writing.

Erika, Dee & Scott Newcombe unearthed Hannah Harwood's headstone from the Baptist Cemetery. Webb & Hannah were the first settlers in Macedon in 1789 from Massachusetts. The headstone is now

at the Academy waiting for the next step in preserving it.

Community Chat with the Wiedrick's Veterans Day 2024





Holly Wiedrick McCoy read excerpts from her grandfather, Walter Wiedrick's diary for when he was stationed at Pearl Harbor. It was a very moving afternoon as she read excerpts, covering moment by moment of the day as her Grandfather wrote. Holly made a scrapbook of all the items of her Grandfather, Walter Weidrick, Sr., Uncle Walter Weidrick, Jr, and her father Thomas Wiedrick. She even has the dog tags.

One of the most emotional moment is when Holly spoke of dates after December 7th, 1941, The mayhem continued for many years.

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
